

A DESIGN CODE FOR SURREY

Surrey Country Council have just launched their web based highways design code and we're incredibly proud to have led its creation with them. It is a tool that draws on a database of rules and allows you to search for the exact coding requirement you want, de-risking and helping great place-making.
